Thesis Statements

Topic 1: The Representation of Refugee Children in American Culture

- 1. Representations of refugee children in American culture depict significant changes within internal family dynamics. Often, they depict intergenerational conflicts.
- 2. The topic of belonging and people's struggle for belonging plays a crucial role in American representations of refugee children.
- 3. An attempt to individualize refugee children is reflected in American cultural representations of refugee children, who are given a voice rarely heard in political debates.
- 4. The novel [Novel Title] (Year) by [Author's Name] and the movie [Movie Title] (Year) depict different perspectives on the traumatic experience of being a 'Lost Boy' from Sudan.
- 5. The photographies and artworks listed point to and critically examine the different ways that refugee children are looked at, but often not seen by American society.
- 6. The importance of language for refugee children plays a significant role in the poetry as well as in the memoir of Vietnamese American writer [Authors Name].
- 7. The short stories by [author's name] and [author's name] use references to food and popular culture to adress problems of identity experienced by refugee children.

Topic 2: The Representation of Native Americans in 21st Century American Culture

- 1. Activism plays an important role in 21st Century American representations of Native Americans, whether by Native peoples or non-Native peoples.
- 2. The depiction of community relations beyond the nuclear familiy--both broken and intact-is a significant part of representations of Native Americans in 21st Century American culture.
- 3. Representations of Native Americans in 21st Century American culture reflect a strong correlation between social struggles and the celebration of Native cultures.
- 4. Human-land and human-nature relations continue to play an important role in 21st Century American representations of Native Americans, often challenging older tropes.
- 5. In contrast to the other primary materials, the SF novel [Novel title] (year] by [author's name] shows a shift in power hierarchies between Native and non-Native peoples.
- 6. The in/visibility of Native Americans in American culture is an important theme in the movies [Movie Title] (year) and [Movie Title] (Year).
